<u>LEGISLATION</u> – 1. PURPOSE. To seek enactment of legislation that is promilitary/veteran.

- **2. CONCEPT.** Organize NC MOAA into 2 Elements: Council Team & Chapter Legislative Team to begin operations after the November 2020 elections.
- a. Council Team: The Council will be led by the COC 1st Vice President. This team will focus on 2021 & 2022 Legislative Calendar & establish relationship with NC National Guard Adjutant General (TAG), NC Department of Military & Veterans Affairs (DMVA), and NC Veterans Council (NCVC).
- 1) Identify the bill numbers/bill language and House/Senate committees to which they are introduced. (We have agreed that we pick +/- 10 bills) to track.
- 2)Work with agencies above to develop military/veteran issues to be addressed in the 2021-2022 legislative session
- 3) Review pending 2020 veteran/military bills to insure they transition to the 2021 calendar.
- 4) Meet with Senate President & House Speaker Policy Advisors to put specific military/veteran legislation on "Fast Track."
- 5) Identify both Sen/House legislative principals to insure introduction of military friendly legislative bills.
- 6) Identify both Sen/House sponsoring Committee Chairs/Members and the bills with bill numbers.
- 7) Develop Point Papers for use by Council Team & Chapter Legislative Teams in communicating with legislators.
- 8) Attend both Sen/House Committee meetings as Council of Chapters (COC) resources permit.
- 9) Provide guidance/support to Chapter Legislative Teams in their advocacy efforts with bill sponsoring/bill supporting legislators.
- b. Chapter Legislative Team: Focus on 2021 Legislative Calendar by subscribing to www.ncleg.gov North Carolina House and Senate Committee Meeting Notice and Bill Sponsor Notifications.
- 1) Develop a working knowledge in using www.ncleg.gov bill identification and bill tracking tools.
- 2) Identify and collect contact information regarding Senators/House legislators in your district following 2020 election.
- 3) Meet/brief your Legislators on bills supporting military/veteran issues.
- 4) Invite your Legislators to Chapter meetings.
- 5) Contact your legislators to support specific bills provided by Council Team.
- 6) keep Council Team apprised of your legislative activity.

Compensation: Free coffee at meetings. Also, we offer comradery with Council Officers and Chapter



TRICARE - Have you been billed for two copays related to a single outpatient medical appointment? MOAA's investigating similar reports, and your experience may help clear up a question of TRICARE policy.

Some TRICARE beneficiaries have been billed a copay for a facility fee in addition to the typical copay for their provider office visit, MOAA has learned recently. We are working to clarify how facility fees are handled by TRICARE, but in the meantime, we would like to get a better understanding of the scope of this issue.

If you believe you may have been charged a second copay for an office visit, related to a facility fee, please tell us at legis@moaa.org.

Facility fees aren't new. Hospitals are allowed to charge patients a facility fee, on top of the charges for medical services, to help cover the high cost of running a hospital. Patients sometimes encounter facility fees when they receive care from a provider office attached to a hospital or medical center.

A recently completed joint effort between the VA and the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) to digitize Vietnam-era deck logs should simplify and speed up the claims process for <u>Blue Water Navy</u> veterans.

VA Announces Completion of Vietnam-Era Deck Log Digitization

VA announced completion of the digitization of the Navy and Coast Guard records from 1956 to 1978 in a <u>Sept. 28 press release</u>. All Navy deck logs from the period were digitized by December 2019, per the release, with the Coast Guard logs finished in September 2020.

The digital records will ease the validation process for whether beneficiaries served in the waters off Vietnam, establishing a presumptive exposure to toxic defoliants such as Agent Orange and making them eligible for benefits under the <u>Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019</u>. NARA will make the logs available online to researchers and others.

That law went into effect Jan. 1. Since that date, VA has paid out \$641 million in benefits to 22,254 Blue Water Navy veterans and survivors, per the Sept. 28 release. That means nearly \$60 million has been paid out since July 31, when VA reported \$583.8 million in total payments for 20,690 granted claims.

The current list of 14 Agent Orange presumptive diseases can be found <u>at this link</u>. MOAA has supported language in the Senate draft of the FY 2021 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) that <u>would add three conditions</u> to the list: bladder cancer, hypothyroidism, and Parkinsonism symptoms.

The release did not address submarine deck logs, which were not included in the original grouping from the archives. This group is not included in the toxic-exposure presumption, and there is no official estimate of when, or if, this group will be included.

Veterans, dependents, and surviving spouses can contact VA at (800) 827-1000 for more information on filing a claim, or can reach out to an approved <u>veterans service organization (VSO)</u> for guidance.

MOAA GUIDANCE ON PARTISAN POLITICAL ACTIVITIES

Partisan Political Activities. As organizations exempt from federal taxation under Sec. 501(c)(19) of the Internal Revenue Code, MOAA and its affiliates must take care to avoid engaging in partisan political activities. Under IRS rules, we are prohibited from directly or indirectly participating in, or intervening in, any political campaign on behalf of (or in opposition to) any candidate for public office.

Candidates for Public Office. A candidate for public office is an individual who offers himself or herself, or is proposed by others, as a contestant for an elective public office, whether such office is national, state, or local, and includes incumbent candidates. The prohibition also extends beyond declared candidates and may apply to efforts to recruit an individual to run for office or advance exploratory activities. The prohibition also applies to advocating for the platform of one political party over another.

Prohibited Activities.

Activities which constitute participation or intervention in a political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to a candidate include, but are not limited to, the publication or distribution of written or printed statements or the making of oral statements on behalf of or in opposition to such a candidate. It is clear that the prohibition on partisan political activity prohibits such outright actions such as posting a "Vote for Biden" or "Vote for Trump" on the organization's website, or "Support Republican Candidates" or "Vote Democratic."

In addition to these obvious examples, the prohibition goes well beyond direct expressions of support. In

determining whether an organization is engaged in unlawful partisan political activities, the IRS applies a "facts and circumstances" test. The IRS looks not only to the expressed language, but to external factors, such as the

communication's timing, its targeted audience, and how the message relates to public policy positions that distinguish a candidate in a campaign.

Consequences for Violations. The consequences to an organization that violates the prohibition on partisan political activity can be severe including the loss of its tax exempt status and the imposition of certain excise taxes. For public charities, like The MOAA Foundation and the MOAA Scholarship Fund, the IRS can disallow tax deductions for charitable contributions. In addition, for an organization whose mission involves advocacy on key military community issues, MOAA must seek support from elected representatives from both parties. Engaging in partisan political activities on behalf of one party or candidate would seriously undermine MOAA's ability to achieve the bipartisan consensus on key issues essential to achieving its legislative objectives.

Personal Opinions. As individuals, members and leaders of MOAA and MOAA's affiliates are not prohibited from engaging in partisan political activities so long as they do so in way that makes it clear they are acting for themselves and do not appear to be speaking on behalf of MOAA or its affiliates. For example, it is permissible for an individual to express his or her personal preference in support of or in opposition to a candidate or political party. And they may do so publicly. However, when expressing their personal opinions or preferences, they may not make reference to their MOAA position, use MOAA communications channels, use MOAA letterhead or newsletters, identify themselves as MOAA leaders, or imply that MOAA or its members share their beliefs.

Leadership Responsibilities. Those in leadership positions have a special responsibility to separate their personal political opinions from statements that are or can be attributed to MOAA or its affiliates. For example, it is improper for a chapter leader to use the chapter's newsletter to advance the leader's personal political beliefs. This goes beyond statements expressly advocating for a specific candidate or party by name. Statements that incorporate campaign messaging, campaign slogans, and political positions identified with a particular candidate or party are also prohibited. No MOAA leader is authorized to use MOAA's or an affiliate's resources to communicate their personal political beliefs. This is an outright violation of the leader's fiduciary duty to the organization and a serious leadership and ethical failure.

Divisive Social Issues. We are all aware of the divisive nature of the debate over today's leading social issues – protesting during the national anthem at sporting events, racial justice, public protests, and the conduct of law enforcement officers. These are issues over which many Americans have deeply held, but differing, personal beliefs. This is also true within the military community among the ranks of active duty and retired officers and within MOAA itself. MOAA leaders have an obligation to keep this in mind when communicating on behalf of MOAA or its affiliates. Suggesting that MOAA only supports one side of a deeply divisive issue sends a message to those with a different belief that MOAA is not for them. Officers today have grown up in a military culture that is very different than the past. Many are accepting of attitudes and views that were not mainstream when many of us were in uniform. If MOAA is going to connect with the newest generation of uniformed officers, it needs to be clear that those with strong views on racial and social justice imperatives are just as welcome as those who adhere to more traditional expressions of patriotism and officership.

Membership Requirements: Commissioned and Warrant Officers of the seven uniformed services (Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and U.S. Public Health Service) and the reserve and other components of these services may become regular members.
