<u>LEGISLATIVE ISSUES</u> -In case you have been wondering how things are going with the MOAA Advocacy in Action program for 2022, here is the latest news from our chapter. You may remember that our effort was to propose two pieces of legislation and advocate for a reasonable military pay raise in light of inflation. The pieces of legislation are HR 1282, the Major Richard Star Act and HR 4834 The Stop Co-pay Overpay Act. HR

1282 allows combat injured veterans to collect both disabilities pay from the VA as well as appropriate retired pay from DOD, consistent with their time in service. I have been able to reach out to three Congressional offices in our area, Rep. Alma Adams (NC 12), Rep. Dan Bishop (NC 9), and Rep. Kathy Manning (NC 6). Although they all appear willing to hear our opinions, so far I am not aware of any legislative movement for any of these proposals. I will let you know if anything changes in the future.

Member Benefits: While MOAA's basic membership provides an all-electronic experience to members, paid membership (Premium and Life) provides member access to books and guides, financial advice, career transition services, expert advice on military pay and benefits, and so much more.

SURVIVING SPOUSE CORNER:



Since 1993, surviving spouses are falling further and further behind in meeting their financial obligations from month-to-month. Many surviving spouses of WWII, Korea and Vietnam are receiving only DIC. These DIC recipients struggle monthly with their budget of \$1,357.56, juggling bills to meet the rising costs in health and dental insurance, housing, utilities, food, clothing and other living expenses. Some receive DIC and minimum Social Security benefits.

Congress must take action to rectify this inequity by increasing the current amount of DIC to a level comparable to other federal employees. Surviving spouses from WWII, Korea, and the Vietnam are now in their 60's through 90's. These surviving spouses are in dire need for an increase in DIC. MOAA supports S. 976 and similar legislation in the House to increase DIC from 43 percent (\$1,357.56) to 55 percent to align with other federal benefits. the downsizing processes.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION - VETERANS'BENEFITS

HOW TO REPORT THE DEATH OF A RETIRED SOLDIER

Contact the Department of the Army Casualty and Mortuary Affairs Operations Division anytime by calling (800) 626-3317. You will be immediately referred to a local Casualty Assistance Center, who will report the death to the Defense Finance and Accounting Service to stop retired pay and initiate the survivor benefits process. If you reside overseas and the toll free number is not available, call your Retirement Services Officer listed on page 15 for assistance. When reporting the death, please provide as much of the information below as you have:

• Full name • Disability Rating • Copy of death certificate • Social security number and/or service number • Circumstances surrounding the death • Retirement date • Date and place of birth • Next of Kin (NOK) information • Retired rank

MOAA's Top Three Priorities 2022- Get involved today!

- 1. Major Richard Star Act House: H.R 1282 Senate Bill S. 344 Impacts current and future members who may face the same fate of early retirements due to com-bat injuries.
- 2. Stop Copay Overpay Act House Bill H.R. 4824 Tricare Mental Health Copay Directs Secretary of Defense to limit copayments for outpatient visits for mental health or behavioral health under the TRICARE program, and for other purposes.
- 3. 4.6% Military Pay Raise Focused on the 4.6% raise for all ranks. Addresses currently serving and their families (pay and benefits).
- 4. Increase Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) (H.R. 3402) and (S 976)-Caring for Survivors Act, #1 Goal of The Military Coalition Survivor Committee Brings DIC payments in line with benefits to surviving spouses of Federal employees!

<u>VA BURIALS & MEMORIALS PAGE</u>: VA burial benefits can help service members, military retirees, veterans, and their family members plan and pay for a burial or memorial service, whether in a local cemetery or in a VA national cemetery. Family members can also order memorial items to honor the service of a Veteran. The VA Burial and Memorial Products Quick Start Guide (QSG) provides clear and concise information on VA burial benefits for Veterans, their families, caregivers and survivors; read the guide at https://www.va.gov/burials-and-memorials-guide.pdf Go to https://www.va.gov/burials-memorials/#get to find out how to apply for burial benefits and how to plan for a burial in advance or at time of need.

MILITARY FUNERAL HONORS: The National Defense Act of 2000 (Public Law 106-65) authorizes Military Funeral Honors to Active Duty Soldiers, Retirees and Veterans. Under the law, at a family's request, every eligible veteran will receive military funeral honors, to include the presence of a military funeral honors detail

that will oversee folding and presenting the U.S. flag and playing "Taps". Your funeral director is responsible for making the necessary arrangements. Go to

HOW TO GET URGENT CARE UNDER YOUR TRICARE HEALTH PLAN

Urgent care might be an option for you if you don't believe you have an emergency," said Dr. Stacy Usher, lead nurse of Clinical Oversight and Integration for the TRICARE Health Plan. "Urgent medical conditions are usually ones that aren't considered emergencies but still require professional medical attention within 24 hours. Examples might include a small cut that might need stitches, a fever, or a sprained ankle."

<u>Emergency care</u> means care for an illness or injury that threatens your life, limb, sight, or safety. If you reasonably believe you have an emergency, always call 911 or your international emergency number. Or, go to the nearest emergency room.

If you have questions about your injury or illness, you can call the <u>Military Health System Nurse Advice Line</u>. Nurses are available 24/7 to help you find the care you need. Are you in the U.S., Guam, or Puerto Rico? If yes, call 1-800-874-2273 and choose option 1. You can find other countries' numbers on the website.

Retirees and Family Members

If you're a retiree or retiree family member in TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select, you can get urgent care from any TRICARE-authorized urgent care center without a referral. You should see a TRICARE network provider to avoid more out-of-pocket costs.

Would you like to know more about your potential costs? For details about all the network and non-network costs for urgent care, you can check out the <u>TRICARE 2022 Costs and Fees Sheet</u>. Or, you can choose your health plan and your status on the <u>TRICARE Costs</u> page to see your current costs.

Remember, urgent care is for minor medical issues. You can search online for a <u>TRICARE-authorized urgent</u> care center near you. You can also call your <u>regional contractor</u> for help finding an urgent care center. Learn more about urgent care, so you know where and when to go if you need care.
