President's message

LTC Joe L. Anderson, Sr.



Lieutenant Colonel Joe L. Anderson, Sr., Charlotte-Metrolina Chapter Immediate Past President, passed away on December 4, 2024. Colonel Anderson, raised in Charlotte and graduated from West Charlotte High School in 1966. He matriculated at North Carolina A& T State University, graduating with the Class of 1970 and an US Army commission. Colonel Anderson served on active duty from 1971 to 1973 then continued serving with the US Army Reserves. He retired in 1996 as a Lieutenant Colonel. Additionally, Colonel Anderson had a successful 32year career with Eastman Kodak Company. He retired from Eastman Kodak in 2002 as a Senior Human Resources Manager. While serving both with the US Army and Eastman Kodak, Colonel Anderson was a founding member and first President of the Veterans Network of Kodak Employees (VETNET).

VETNET is one of the seven employee networks at Kodak, serving over 5,000 veterans. Colonel Anderson was also a founding member and first President of the Rochester, New York NC A&T SU Alumni Association. He is a former member of the NC A&T SU Board of Visitors and a recipient of the university's Distinguished Service Award. Of very special importance to Colonel Anderson was his ministry as church Deacon for 6 churches in 5 states with his final assignment as an ordained Deacon at Ebenezer Baptist Church, Charlotte, NC.

Immediate Past President Colonel Anderson was instrumental in solidifying the success of our MOAA Charlotte-Metrolina Chapter. He led the celebration of our 50th Anniversary Gala which presented National President, Lt Gen Brian Kelly as the keynote speaker. Colonel Anderson continued his pursuit of youth development with our JROTC scholarship program. He directed the inclusion of 2 ROTC scholarships at the University of North Carolina, Charlotte with the Army and Air Force detachments. Chapter members will testify that Colonel Anderson's smile and greeting was always present as they entered the Chapter meetings. Lieutenant Colonel Joe L. Anderson is survived by his bride of 53 years, 3 children, Joe L. Anderson, Jr., Jeffrey L. Anderson, and April N. Anderson, 10 grandchildren, 7 siblings, many other family members, Fraternity brothers, and community friends. A proud salute to Lieutenant Colonel Joe L. Anderson, Sr. for his legacy of dedicated work and service to our Nation. He will be missed, but his mentoring and teaching will be reflected in the continued success of the Charlotte-Metrolina Chapter of the Military Officer Association of America.

YOUR "INDEF" DOD IDENTIFICATION CARD LIKELY WON'T BE AS "INDEFINITE" AS ADVERTISED.

While no date has been set for the expiration of the paper-based Uniformed Services Identification Card (USID), DoD "is currently evaluating the potential phase-out" of those cards, a DoD spokesperson told MOAA on Oct. 17 – even cards with "extended or indefinite expiration dates."

Previous DoD guidance listed 2026 as a likely cutoff date, though the spokesperson did not provide any date in an emailed response to questions. However, DoD does "encourage all holders of paper-based 'INDEF' cards, to include all retirees, to replace them with Next Gen USID Cards by scheduling an appointment at their nearest ID card issuance facility at their convenience," per the email.

Some retirees and family members may be able to renew their "INDEF" cards online and skip the inperson appointment. If you have a paper-based ID card and want to upgrade, here's a walk-through of the process for in-person and online renewal/replacement.

In Person

- Find your nearest ID office at this link. You'll be able to search by location, find hours and contact information for nearby offices, and make your appointment online.
- Ensure you bring all required documents for an ID card renewal/reissuance.

Online



First, you'll need to determine your eligibility for online renewal. According to DoD, in order to skip the in-person appointment:

- The sponsor must have a common access card (CAC) or a DoD Self-Service Logon (DS Logon).
- The sponsor and the cardholder must have authorized DoD to use their email to contact them via the ID Card Office.
- The cardholder must have a current mailing address in the U.S. (or an APO/FPO/DPO address; no post office boxes) and a photo taken in the last 12 years, both on file with the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS). Learn how to update your DEERS record at this link.

If you are eligible, visit the ID Card Office Online at this link and click the "Family ID Cards" block. You'll need to log in via CAC or DS Logon to begin the process; you can learn more about eligibility, requirements, and proof of identity at this link.

Further ID card questions should be directed to the Defense Manpower Data Center. Its customer support team can be reached at (800) 538-9552 Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., excluding federal holidays.

MOAA DATABASE TRANSITION TIMELINE AND IMPACT

As a reminder, the transition of MOAA's database is not done as of this date. They hope to have it in place by the end of the year. Council and Chapter leaders do not have access to the Committee Module or NRT Report.

MOAA members received this <u>update on MOAA's system upgrade</u> and how this might impact their access to information during the transition. This message also explains how this transition will impact logging into MOAA.org, with the "email of record" replacing usernames when accessing online accounts. Members should <u>contact the Member Service Center</u> if they have multiple emails on file with MOAA to determine the email of record. Passwords will not change under the new system, and access to <u>MOAA's Legislative Action Center</u> will not be affected. Further instructions on using the new system will be available in the coming weeks.

TONYA STAR, WIDOW OF MAJ. RICHARD STAR, DIES AT 51 AUGUST 16, 2024

Tonya Star, a tireless advocate on behalf of combat-injured veterans and the legislation bearing the name of her late husband, passed away Aug. 12 at her home in Euless, Texas. She was 51.

Star's husband, Maj. Richard Star, USAR, was diagnosed with stage 4 metastatic terminal lung cancer in 2018. She immediately put personal ambitions aside as she was "thrust into becoming a full-time caregiver, advocate, and lung cancer researcher," she wrote in a <u>2020 MOAA.org</u> <u>article</u>.



Maj. Richard Star succumbed to his illness <u>in February 2021</u>. Tonya Star remained an active participant in ongoing advocacy work for the Major Richard Star Act, which would end a compensation offset faced by tens of thousands of combat-injured retirees.

"You could not ask for a better ally in this fight," said Lt. Col. Mark Belinsky, USA (Ret), MOAA's director of Government Relations for Currently Serving and Retired Affairs. "Tonya's presence motivated all of us to continue our work on the Hill, on the phone, anywhere we thought we could make a difference. Her work, both alongside her husband and after his passing, made our progress on this bill possible."
